AN ANGLICAN MOMENT

The Book of Ecclesiasticus (also known as Sirach) is found in the Apocrypha, which are a set of Jewish writings produced between 300 BC and 70 AD. These writings include 1 & 2 Esdras, Tobit, Judith, Additions to Esther, Ecclesiasticus, Baruch, Susanna, Song of the Three Children, Bel & the Dragon, Manasseh, 1 & 2 Maccabees). Traditionally the Roman Catholic Church has included the Apocrypha in their authoritative canon for the Bible, while Protestants have not. In Anglicanism, the Apocrypha may be used in worship, but it is not considered Holy Scripture. This means it can provide examples and instruction for life, but is not used for the establishment of doctrine. For this reason, the lector concludes the following reading with "Here ends the reading" rather than "The Word of the Lord".

THE FIRST READING: Ecclesiasticus 15:11-20

English Standard Version of the Apocrypha

¹¹ Do not say, 'It was the Lord's doing that I fell away'; for he does not do what he hates. ¹² Do not say, 'It was he who led me astray'; for he has no need of the sinful. ¹³ The Lord hates all abominations; such things are not loved by those who fear him. ¹⁴ It was he who created humankind in the beginning, and he left them in the power of their own free choice. ¹⁵ If you choose, you can keep the commandments, and to act faithfully is a matter of your own choice. ¹⁶ He has placed before you fire and water; stretch out your hand for whichever you choose. ¹⁷ Before each person are life and death, and whichever one chooses will be given. ¹⁸ For great is the wisdom of the Lord; he is mighty in power and sees everything; ¹⁹ his eyes are on those who fear him, and he

knows every human action. ²⁰ He has not commanded anyone to be wicked, and he has not given anyone permission to sin.

^ An Aramaic word that means “empty one”

+ the Greek word *Gebenna* is commonly translated as “hell”, though it refers to the Valley of Ben Hinnom south of Jerusalem, which was where Israel made child sacrifices (with fire) to false gods in the 8th Century BC. But when God allowed the Babylonians to conquer Israel as a punishment for this in the early 6th century BC, this valley was where Jerusalem disposed of their dead bodies.

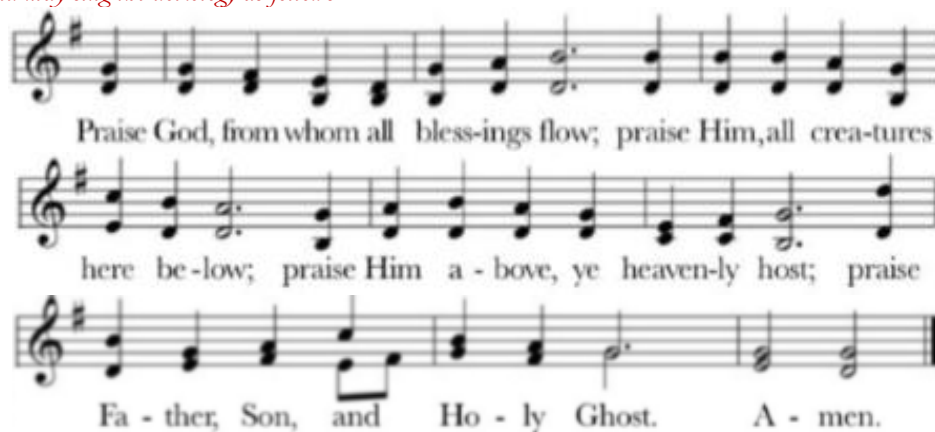

THE PRAYER OF CONSECRATION

The People kneel as able. The Celebrant continues

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and when we had sinned against you and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent your only Son Jesus Christ into the world for our salvation. By the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary he became flesh and dwelt among us. In obedience to your will, he stretched out his arms upon the Cross and offered himself once for all, that by his suffering and death we might be saved. By his resurrection he broke the bonds of death, trampling Hell and Satan under his feet. As our great high priest, he ascended to your right hand in glory, that we might come with confidence before the throne of grace.

At the following words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it, or lay a hand upon it, and here may break the bread; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing the wine to be consecrated.*

On the night that he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks, he broke it,* and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take, eat; this is my Body, which is given for you: Do this in remembrance of me."

Likewise, after supper, Jesus took the cup, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying, “Drink this, all of you; for this is my Blood of the New Covenant, which is shed for you, and for many, for the forgiveness of sins: Whenever you drink it, do this in remembrance of me.”

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Celebrant and People

Christ has died.

Christ is risen.

Christ will come again.

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, and we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Word and Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son Jesus Christ. Sanctify us also, that we may worthily receive this holy Sacrament, and be made one body with him, that he may dwell in us and we in him. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us with all your saints into the joy of your heavenly kingdom, where we shall see our Lord face to face.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **Amen.**

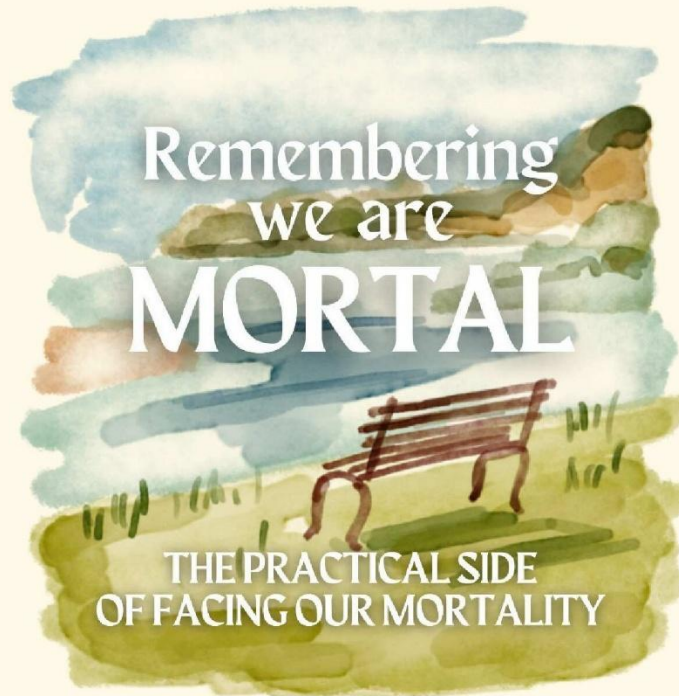
