## INFANT BAPTISM IS APPROPRIATE WHEN THERE IS A REASONABLE EXPECTATION OF ACTIVE LIFE IN THE CHURCH

### INFANT BAPTISM FROM A COVENANT THEOLOGY PERSPECTIVE

"Baptism isn't primarily a way for us to show our faith and devotion. As with worship more generally, God is the agent here. Baptism is a sacrament precisely because it is a means of grace, a way that God's gracious initiative marks and seals us. It is the sign that God is a covenant-keeping Lord who fulfills his promises even when we don't. This is why, since the time of the early church, households have been baptized (Acts 16:33, 1cor 1:16), and it is why, historically in 'catholic' Christianity, believing parents present their children for baptism. Baptism is not a bottom-up expression of our faith but a top-down symbol of God's gracious promises. He chose us before we could believe; he loves before we even know how. Baptism signals our initiation into a people..."

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> There are 3 holy oils regularly used in the life of the Church: Oil of Chrism, Oil for Catechumens, Oil for the Sick; each have a unique recipe combining olive oil and balsam. These oils are typically stored in the ambry. Only Bishops have the right to consecrate the chrism, as was stated at the Second Council of Carthage (390 AD). This is done each year at the Mass of Chrism, traditionally held during Holy Week (but held a week earlier in the Anglican Diocese of San Joaquin) when the clergy of the Diocese also renew their ordination yows.

- 3. Begin writing Spiritual Autobiography for Bp Menees (according to the guidelines below), due 2 weeks before the Confirmation service

## Guidelines for Writing a Spiritual Autobiography for Confirmands, Receptions, and Reaffirmations in the Diocese of San Joaquin

The Bishop's usual practice is to try and meet in person with candidates for Confirmation, Reception, or Reaffirmation prior to the laying on of hands service, in order to hear from them – in their own words – the story of their faith thus far and why they want to take this step in their faith. However, from time to time and in certain years, this type of one-on-one meeting will not be possible.

In order to be certain that the Bishop is still able to get to know the candidates, he requires that each candidate write a brief spiritual autobiography, with the help of their sponsors and/or clergy. The following are some minimum guidelines (not exhaustive) for the types of information a spiritual autobiography of this sort should provide:

- What is your faith background? Did you grow up in a Christian home environment, some other faith, or with no faith at all?
- When did you begin your relationship with Jesus? Has it been ongoing since your baptism as an infant, or were you older?
- What impact has following Jesus had on your life? What role has your faith played in your day-to-day activities, whether school, work, or social/recreational?
- What do you think Confirmation is, and why is being Confirmed/Received or Reaffirming your faith something you want to do right now
- What does being an Anglican mean to you?
- Do you believe the Nicene Creed? Why is it important?

### **Saint Matthias Anglican Church**

The founding of St. Matthias in Oakdale dates back to 1884. It was officially recognized by the Episcopal Diocese of California in 1887. In those early years, services were held in various locations, including the back of a saloon and was initially served by The Rev D.O. Parker who would walk from Sonora. A permanent home was built in 1905 and consecrated by Bishop Nichols in 1907. 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<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> Prior to 2018, there was a distinction in the Diocese of San Joaquin between Parishes and Missions, with parishes being able to self-support, including a full time priest, and missions being unable to do so. Now that this distinction is dissolved, all congregations function as parishes and use "parish terminology" whether they can afford a full-time clergy person or not. Under the previous model, the rector of a Mission was the Bishop, if there was a priest in charge, they were called a "vicar", the Vestry was called a "Bishop's Committee", and the Sr Warden was called a "Bishop's Warden".

At this time, the Diocese of San Joaquin, unusually, is in a season of transition concerning its Cathedral at this time. The former Cathedral congregation, St James, merged two years ago with the Hispanic congregation, Our Lady of Guadalupe, to form Emmanuel Anglican Church, but they have only recently acquired their own property that might become the 'cathedral'.

The Diocese of San Joaquin began as a missionary district of the Episcopal Church USA in 1911. It became a Diocese of the Episcopal Church in 1961. It disaffiliated from the Episcopal Church in 2008 and was one of the founding Dioceses of the Anglican Church in North America in 2009.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>3</sup> Until a few years ago, there were six deaneries: the Delta, Yosemite, Fresno, Sequoia, Kern, Sierra. St Matthias was in the Yosemite Deanery. Fr Jim Stout served as Dean of Delta for many years.

## **Province**

THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH USA WAS THE ONLY ANGLICAN PROVINCE IN THE UNITED STATES + THE ANGLICAN CHURCH OF CANADA WAS THE ONLY ANGLICAN PROVINCE IN CANADA

IN 2009, THIS CHANGED WHEN OUR PROVINCE, THE ANGLICAN CHURCH IN NORTH AMERICA (ACNA), FORMED

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>4</sup> Historically this was referred to as the Assessment, and under the previous bishop the amount congregations in the diocese were *required* to give went as high as 17-18%. When Bishop Menees was consecrated in 2011, he reduced this to 10%.


North America is the only continent where there are overlapping Provinces. This occurred after dioceses and parishes that left the Anglican Church of Canada and the Episcopal Church USA formed the ACNA in 2009.

In the ACNA, there are numerous geographically based dioceses, non-geographical dioceses and networks.

Many jurisdictions overlap with each other.

Each diocese or network has a bishop and sometimes suffragan or assistant bishops.

Note: The overlap of Dioceses in the ACNA contrasts with the Structure of The Episcopal Church, where there is *no* geographic overlap between Dioceses, as this map of Western Episcopal Dioceses shows:

# #GAFCON Global Fellowship of Confessing Anglicans

GAFCON is a global movement within the Communion, which represents the majority of all Anglicans.

The Anglican Communion is in a time of reformation. In 2008, the Global Fellowship of Confessing Anglicans (GAFCON), which represents the majority of the world's Anglicans, called for the creation of a new provincial home in North America for orthodox Anglicans and, in response, the Anglican Church in North America was established in 2009. The Anglican Church in North America is in full communion with the GAFCON Provinces of Brazil, Chile, Congo, Kenya, Myanmar, Nigeria, Rwanda, South America, South Sudan, & Uganda. This recognition continues to grow in momentum with the Anglican Church in North America being made a full partner province of the Global South, an official structure of the Anglican Communion. In addition, there are branches of GAFCON in Australia, the UK, Ghana (Sunyani), Ireland, & Tanzania.



The fourth (IV) meeting of GAFCON, held in 2023 (in Kigali, Uganda), issued a statement repudiating the practice of blessing same-sex marriages in The Episcopal Church USA, The Anglican Church of Canada, and most recently in the Church of England and called them to repentance. GAFCON announced its intention to leave behind "reset the communion" by establishing new structures of communion for the 85% of Anglicans who remain biblically orthodox on this issue.

### DIOCESAN CANON ON MARRIAGE

Sacrament of Marriage (a) The Sacrament of Holy Matrimony is a lifelong covenant between a man and a woman in which the two become one flesh. It is both an ordinance of Creation, affirmed as such by our Lord, and also a sign of the mystical union between Christ and His Church, as commended by Saint Paul. (b) All members of the clergy of this Diocese are prohibited from solemnizing or blessing any union or intimate personal relationship other than between one man and one woman in Holy Matrimony (c) No church facility may be used to solemnize, bless, or celebrate any union or intimate personal relationship other than Holy Matrimony between one man and one woman. (d) All members of the clergy of this Diocese may refuse to solemnize the marriage of any couple for any reason. (ADSJ Canons, Sec. 31.03)
